MEMORANDUM TO MR. JUSTICE JACKSON

SUBJECT: Supplement to My Report on Mission to Washington.

Since dictating the report, I have had a lengthy conference with Captain Wolff, whom G-2 sent to us to bring Wiedeman. We cabled from Washington to you recommending that Captain Wolff be kept here, thinking he would be especially helpful in connection with these witnesses.

He is intimately acquainted with von Rintelen, Kessler and Hardy. He is also the man who trained Captain Halle. In my judgment, he would be the man to take charge of these prisoners if they are brought here. His suggestion is that he ought to be sent back to Washington with another officer to bring the prisoners over and that he could get all of the original interrogations out of the G-2 files as well.

If the prisoners are brought over, they ought to be especially carefully treated, both in Paris and here, to prevent an incident such as happened with Wiedeman in Paris, where the military police put him in jail.

Captain Wolff thinks the ideal arrangement here would be to put him in a house with them, under guard of course, but not to keep them in the jail where they would come in contact with either defendants or witnesses.
